For those who do not already know, I have moved my office from 110 Edgell Road to the Parish House. It is in the Allen Room immediately inside the southern front door near the main office.

The Allen Room honors Richard and Helen Allen, important people in the life of First Parish. Their son Peter and his wife Kris are active and admired members of First Parish. They have chosen the former minister's study at 110 Edgell to be designated as the Allen Room. Peter and Kris have been very generous and gracious about this transition.

This decision to move was not taken lightly, as I am aware that any change in the use of space can be disconcerting in congregational life. Any one of us can get anxious about what space changes mean to our sense of self, security and vision for the future. And, people have varying levels of toleration for change and varying sensi-

tivities to the role of space as well. Additionally, if you were part of a decision that was made in the past about space, knowing how to respond to a possible new direction can be difficult. So, let's keep the conversation open.

Even given all this, having my office in the Parish House seems to mesh my style of ministry and life at First Parish in a better way.

As a result of this change, the topic of how to best use space to serve the mission of First Parish is a very lively one right now. Imagine how many such conversations have transpired over the three centuries at First Parish! Let us each engage in a way that invites the best solutions for the whole, recognizing that change involves both holding on and letting go. This is the challenge and this is the gift of life in a spiritual community. Let us all assume the good will of the other in the process.

## *Theme Based Ministry for October*

OCTOBER THEME FOR PERSONAL AND FAMILY REFLECTION: LOSS

All of life is constant adaptation to change. It is easy to understand how the loss of a beloved person causes grief that takes time to address and transform. And, there are many, many losses along the way...one season to another, children passing through stages of growth or leaving home, our own aging through time. While we may welcome the new possibility that change brings, do we recognize and honor enough the grief that may come with it? Take some time this month to reflect and talk about loss and how it informs your life. Some ideas below...

-The October 5<sup>th</sup> worship service will address this theme, as will the children's story.

-Talk with other adult members of your adult kith and kin about why you have or have not made all of the arrangements that are necessary for your own death. Do you have a will, durable power of attorney, living will, etc. ? No time like the present.

-If your family is experiencing a life transition (eg elderly parents moving from a family home, child going away to college, smaller child starting school) consider planning a ritual to mark this change. It can be as simple as lighting a candle and sharing a memory, or a wish for the child beginning a new chapter, or simply sharing your feelings. In this way we learn to acknowledge that these are significant moments of loss and promise.

-Go to [uua.org](http://uua.org) and click the link to the bookstore. Under family issues is a death and grief section. There are some great selections for adults and children.

For Families with younger children:

-Make it a point to bring something from the outside world into your home at the beginning of each season and talk about how life cycles around from birth to death to rebirth. Autumn is of course the best time to talk about the loss involved in life.

-Read "The Tenth Good Thing About Barney" by Judith Viorst, "Annie and The Old One" by Miska Miles, and see what conversation arises.

## Religious Education

Since "faith" was the theme for the month of September, I led a recent Children's Worship on that same theme. We talked about how faith is hard to see – sometimes it's even invisible, but we know it's there. I told a story about a skinny little plant that was going to grow up into a strong oak tree because she had strong, deep roots underground that people couldn't see. Here at First Parish we strive to help children and youth develop deep roots of faith. Having a sturdy sense of faith gives us strength when life presents us with difficulties and challenges.

How do we develop faith in our children and youth? Naturally the answer to that question varies with the developmental stages of children and youth. We offer age-appropriate activities in which they can experience wonder, reflection, a time for quiet, and a time for celebration. Every class lights a chalice, the symbol of our Unitarian Universalist faith. Young children explore feelings, friendship, and rituals. Slightly older children learn about our Unitarian Universalist stories and practices that help to make a better world. They also learn about other world religions, respecting them and seeing similarities to Unitarian Universalism. Older children and youth grapple with their values, what their unfolding beliefs are, and how they can make a difference in our hurting world. Built into all our curricula is encouragement to question as they learn and grow, all the while being supported by a nurturing community.

Intertwined with children's and youth's individual faith development is growing their identity with this faith

called Unitarian Universalism. Learning and living our UU principles builds an identity with our faith. Older classes figure out how they can take what they discover in classes out into the world – putting their faith into action and impacting their world in a positive way. My hope for our children and youth as they go through this program is that they know deep within themselves what it means to be a Unitarian Universalist and feel proud of that identity.

On more nuts and bolts topics – a "Special Sunday" – those Sundays that fall on three-day weekends – is coming up on October 12<sup>th</sup>. Kindergartners and younger attend their regular classes; grades one through six meet in the Huntley Room for a multi-grade activity, and seventh and eighth graders attend church. Our theme for this year's Special Sundays will be "Putting Our Faith into Action".

Save the date of October 26<sup>th</sup>! The Religious Education Council will be hosting a multi-generational Halloween Party from 5:00 to 8:00 p.m. This evening is sure to be a fun-filled time, and all ages are invited to partake in the fun! Our YRUU (Senior Youth Group) will host their ever-popular Haunted House, which also will be for all ages. Sign-ups will be on October 19<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> during Coffee Hour.

## Update on MetroWest Free Medical Program in Framingham

Last spring many of you heard about the MetroWest Free Medical Program (either at Annual Meeting or at an information session after church) which offers free medical care to the uninsured and underinsured. Currently the Program offers general medical care every Tuesday night at Temple Beth El in Sudbury. A Social Action Working Group has been meeting regularly to plan the opening of a second site in Framingham at First Parish this fall.

The opening date of the Framingham site of the MetroWest Free Medical Program is **Thursday, October 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2008!** We will operate out of 110 Edgell Road every Thursday evening from 6:30 to 8:30pm.

The following services will be offered at our site:

- **Vision Care**

We will have an optometrist each evening who will perform a complete eye exam utilizing a vision chair and pedestal that was donated to us from a similar program in Worcester. An optician will fit the glasses. Patients will be asked to pay a nominal fee for the glasses.

- **Women's Health Care**

The gynecological care will move from Sudbury to Framingham to have more room for general medical care in Sudbury. We will have 2 providers each evening who will do screening exams as well as treat problems.

- **Social Services**

This component of the program will help people access services, sign up for healthcare if they are eligible and screen for mental health problems.

As you can imagine, this endeavor requires lots of volunteers! We have a dedicated group who has been working for months to make this happen. We also have a number of people both from First Parish and from other churches who are willing to volunteer, as well as professionals. However, more help is needed.

We have volunteer openings in the following areas. Please consider becoming involved!

- General volunteers on Thursday evenings to help with set up, greeting and registering patients, assisting the social workers with referring patients to services, assisting clinicians
- General volunteers on other days of the week to call patients back to make appointments, assist with advertising for the program, etc
- Optometrists and opticians
- Portuguese and Spanish translators.

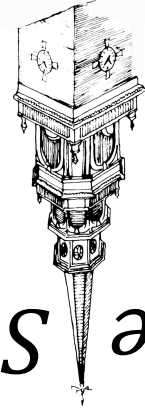
